

Yasmin Sapurji's Wish You Were Here is a mixed-media sculpture which utilizes digitally-enhanced images of postcards from India, England, and Canada. She uses a series of 3 colour postcards produced for Western tourists, and in each she inserts a black and white photograph of a father carrying a child. These postcards are recreated as personal signatures of displacement, but behind them are 3 house frames, which are built to reference a child's vision of home and security.
