

Community Links/ Common Ground

This project brought together artists and activists from various community organisations in Toronto to explore issues of equality and social justice, while also raising awareness of difficult social realities experienced by those in these communities. In helping to facilitate collaborations that focused on creatively engaging with issues of significance, the aim was to foster stronger alliances between visual artists, community activists and cultural workers.

Community Links/Common Ground

Includes a series of four hands on workshops led by artists and activists which focus on creating issue based art projects developed by workshop participants from each organization. This will be followed by an exhibit of works and artist talks.

Also to coincide with the workshops, a community discussion panel on the topic of *Art as Activism,* was held at the 519 Community Centre.

Part two of this project is a multiple-site exhibit which consists of a video screening at Trinity Square Video, and exhibit of work from the workshop series on view at The South Asian Women's Centre.




May 7 2000 Bookmaking Workshop led by Michelle Daniel
